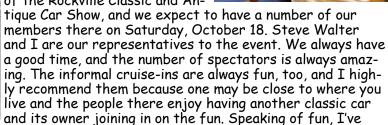

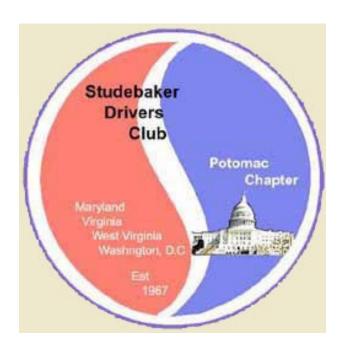

We put almost 800 miles on our 1963 Lark Car -Truck, including a mid-week side trip over to Fallingwater in Mill Run to tour with other family members a historic Frank Lloyd Wright house. What Did You Do to Your Studebaker?

Pete Rutledge — 1954 Studebaker Commander Regal Starlight Coupe

Well, my big project this month was for my '54 Studebaker. I undertook my first-ever transmission rebuild. I rebuilt the Borg-Warner T10 4-speed transmission that I had put in the '54. It had been jumping out of 2nd gear (a common problem with these transmissions), so I removed it from the car and rebuilt it with new bearings, seals, bronze synchromesh rings, and "torque-lock" synchromesh sliders, which are designed to hold the transmission in the selected gear and should fix the jumping-out-of-gear problem. It was an interesting project (a mechanical engineer's dream). The only special tools absolutely essential to doing the job were a hydraulic shop press (20-ton from Harbor Freight) and snap-ring pliers (about \$19 from AutoZone). With the help of a number of YouTubes, a transmission rebuilding book, and an Avanti shop manual, I actually took the transmission apart and put it back together twice, because after the first attempt, I didn't think it was working right. The second attempt was the charm. To put the finishing touches on the project, I have treated the transmission (and myself) to a brand new Hurst Competition Plus shifter (the last time I had one of these shifters was over 50 years ago, when I installed one in

my '58 Corvette and it was wonderful). Now I just need to get the transmission back in the car — easier said than done! If the transmission works as I expect (hope) it to, the '54 should be drivable for greater distances, but there is still work to do: front end rebuild and some painting, inside and out.

THE BOUNCING HOOD

Some solutions are so simple and easy that one wonders why it took so long to reach them. So it was with a terrible front end shake in our GT Hawk on impacting large bumps, potholes or closely spaced successive bumps that set the front of the car rattling like it wanted to come apart.

Play in the club newsletter business long enough and you will eventually hear about every problem that owners of the marque you've chosen ever experience with their vehicles.

For the six years that we had Entropy, it was one problem that I could not fix. For most of this time, I chalked it up to having a stiffly sprung front suspension, a situation only exacerbated by the 'Heavy Duty' front springs and shock absorbers I was using as well as Delrin bushings placed at the control arm pivot points and an addition of a 1- inch front anti- roll bar, complete with polyurethane bushings. In hindsight, my preconceptions of how a stiff suspension would affect the car's ride blinded me to the real problem.

Something still wasn't right though. The Avanti had as non-compliant a front suspension, being a near duplicate of the Hawk but did not shake and rattle over road imperfections. Entropy even continued its shenanigans when I replaced the front springs with lighter 6 cylinder items in order to lower the front end. So, for the umpteenth time, I crawled around under the car shaking, banging and tightening everything in sight with no change. Then a trip to West Palm Beach pushed me over the edge. I had to fix this. . . . It was driving me nuts!

Upon returning home and in near desperation, I tried something I was sure was a long shot and probably wouldn't work. . . Folding a note paper over several times, I squeezed it between the hood and fenders in six different spots, three on each side of the car. . . But it did work - no more rattles, creaks or noises reminiscent of impending Studebaker meltdown from forward of the firewall!

For six years, the hood which had never rested on the small rubber bumpers on each side was now supported well enough that it no longer became a third- rate tuning fork when the suspension had to contend with potholes, washboard roads or other pavement nasties.

OBVIOUS? ... NOT VERY. I had been looking for too complex a reason.

EASY FIX . . . Installation of thicker than stock rubber bumper pads did the trick to forever-more quell the hood's musical inclinations. HAPPINESS RETURNS

THE TAPERED AXLE

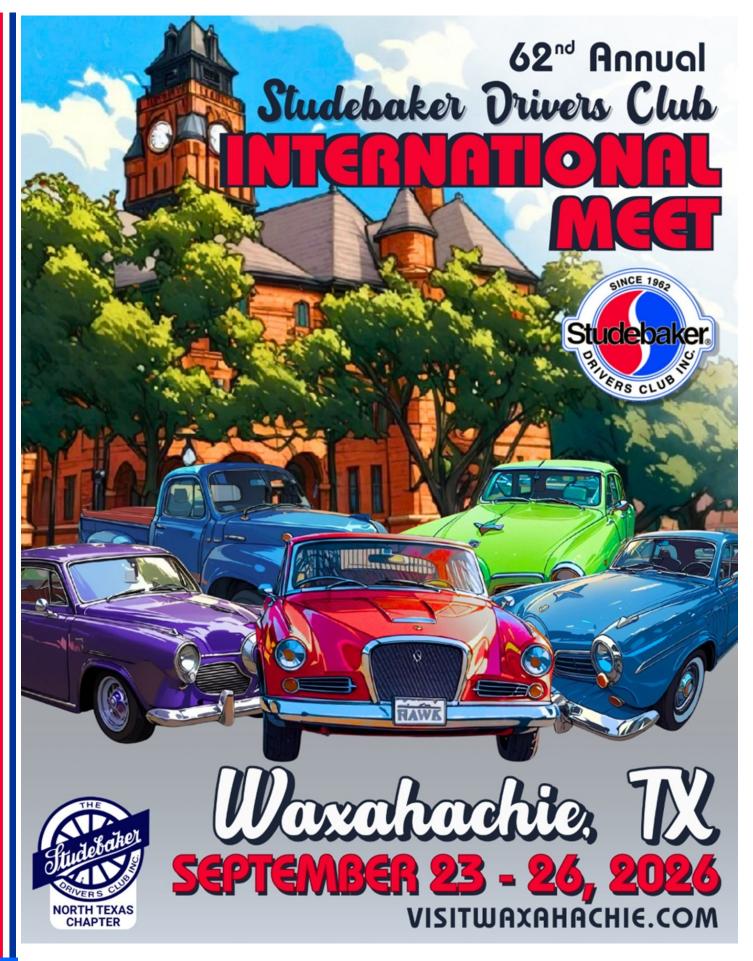
So it was for me about Studebaker's tapered axles and that they sometimes break. Both of our '63 cars use them. With age and miles on these axles, I began to worry a little when I learned of several recent instances in which a tapered rear axle had fractured, imperiling the lives of the occupants in the car.

Should the rear wheels breaking off and passing me on the road, taking its share of the car's brakes with it as it rolls away makes me uncomfortable. A feeling I'm convinced my passengers will share with me should it happen with them in the car. An Avanti owner had it occur while driving on a mountain road, downhill with several of his grandchildren with him. He was able to slow and stop as the car still retained its front brakes and it remained balanced on the remaining three wheels until he stopped. I venture to guess that not everyone will be as lucky, should it happen to them. I know that my luck isn't that good.

My maintenance schedule calls for outer rear axle bearing cleaning and repacking every 25,000 miles. When we first got the Hawk, it had traveled over 142,000 miles with no checks of the rear axle bearings. . . I chipped the old grease, then the consistency of brick with a screwdriver. The Avanti had also been ignored throughout it 109,000 miles of life. To be safe, I replaced both outer bearings on both axles, including the races pressed into the axle housing.

Failing lubrication combined with normal loading can cause catastrophic bearing failure and cracked axles. This situation is more likely still if the car is heavily loaded. If it breaks on the outside of the bearing, nothing remains to hold the wheel on.

It's then "Bye, Bye wheel" and "Hello, expensive repairs and possible medical bills." We all deserve better than this. Check your axles today!
